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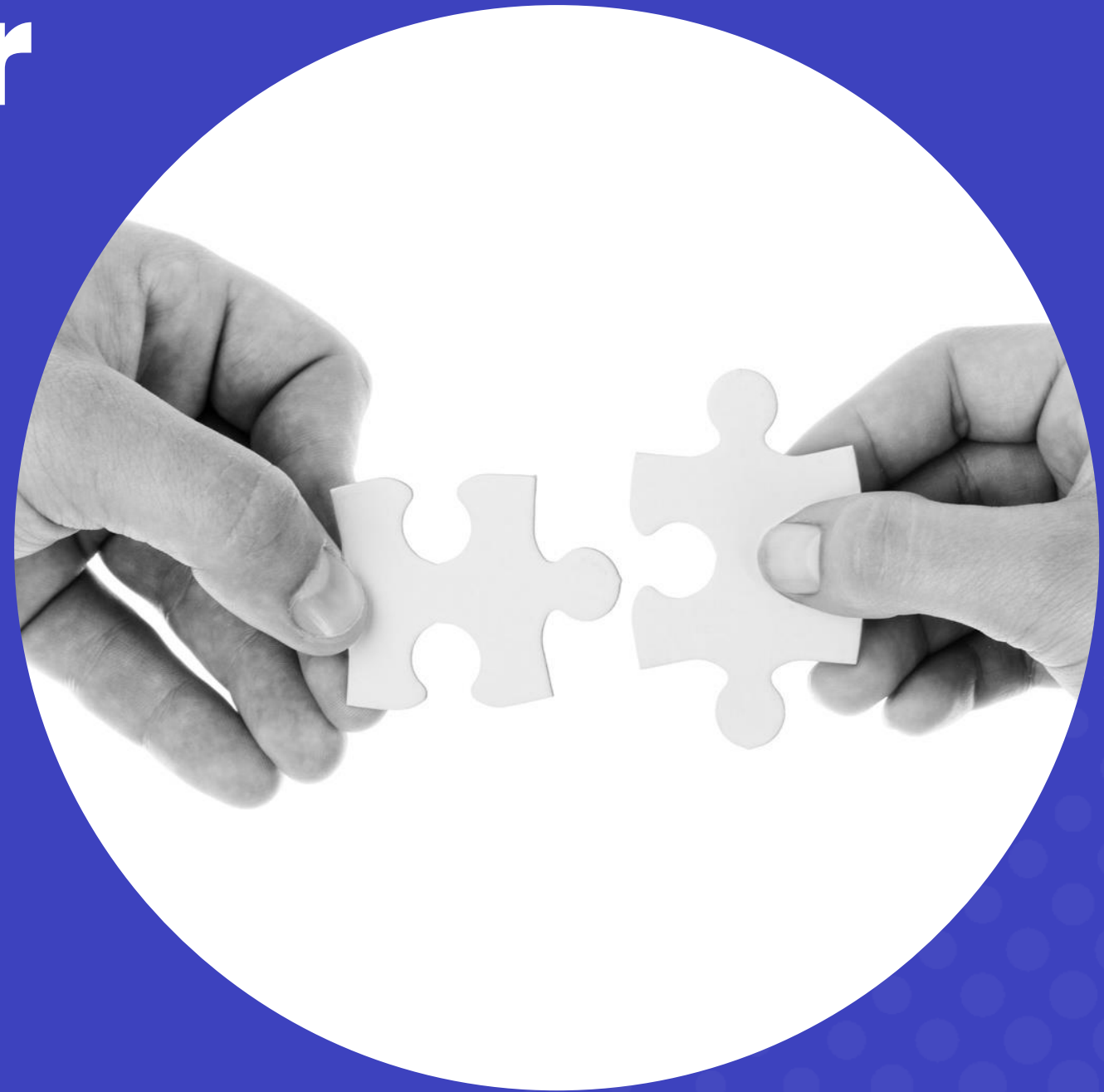
Why integration matters

 - Greatest challenge: language barriers, social cliques
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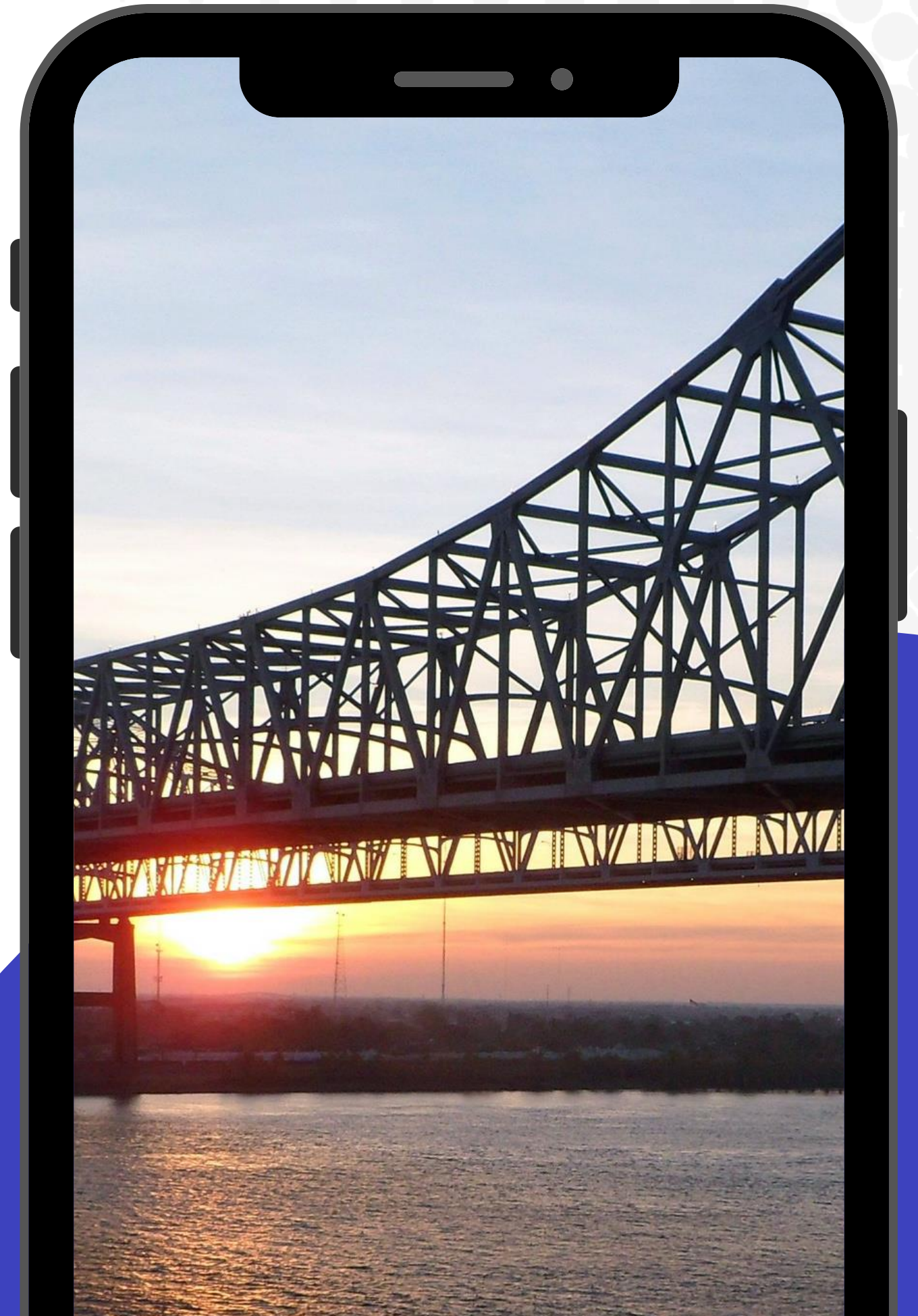
