Applicants are offered more than 600 full degree programmes, covering all higher education fields at all degree levels, including part-time and doctoral programmes.

More than 81 per cent of our scholarship holders would choose Hungary again, which we see as an inspiration to further broaden the scope of the scholarship in the future.

The Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship programme was established by the Hungarian Government to promote the internationalisation of Hungarian higher education and to attract top foreign students from all around the world who can establish personal and professional attachments to Hungary while enjoying high-quality education in the heart of Europe.

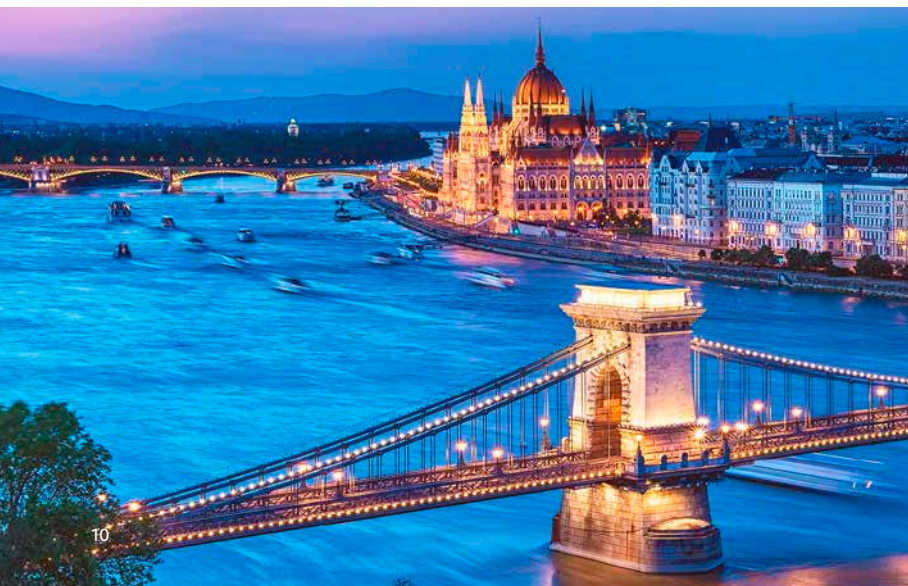
When the graduates return to their home countries with marketable skills and knowledge, they can build civil, political and economic relationships, contributing to Hungary's image and recognition abroad.

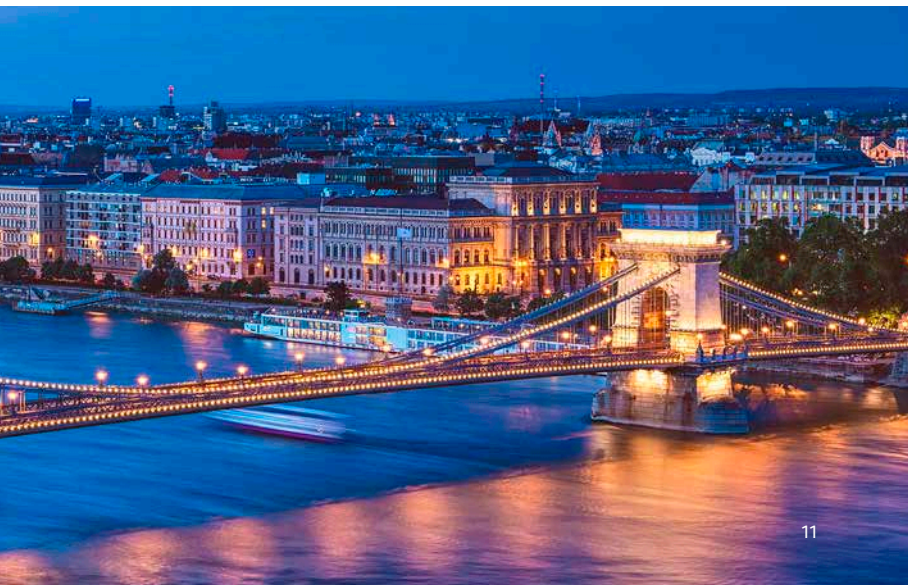




Opportunity

Currently there are 29 Hungarian higher education institutions engaged in the Stipendium Hungaricum Programme with more than 600 study programmes conducted primarily in English.

Since Hungary has always been an integral member of the European higher education community, studying here means that you have the opportunity to obtain an internationally recognised and widely renowned European degree. The high international quality of the Hungarian diplomas also grants you the global perspective, indispensable for advancing in today's labour market.

Brief history



9th century

The conquest of the Carpathian Basin and the foundation of Hungary

The Hungarian tribes from the mountains of the Urals arrived in the Carpathian Basin in 895–896, then conquered the territory and settled down. One hundred years later our first king, Stephen I, founded and established the Kingdom of Hungary as a Christian European country.



15th century

Matthias Corvinus and the Hunyadi era

One of Hungary's most glorious eras was the time of the Hunyadi family in the 15th century, during which Matthias Corvinus the Righteous reigned as the greatest king in the Hungarian history and transformed the country into one of the most important European nations.



16th century

Ottoman rule

Following the battle of Mohács in 1526, the country was divided into three parts due to the Ottoman occupation in Hungary: the Habsburgs controlled the western and northern parts; the Turkish the central area; and as the successor and stronghold of Hungarian culture, the independent Principality of Transylvania held the south-east.



19th century

The Hungarian Revolution of 1848

Following the period of the Spring of Nations across Europe, the Hungarians revolted against the Habsburgs of Austria. As a result of this turbulent era, a compromise was reached with the Habsburgs in 1867 which resulted in the foundation of the Austro-Hungarian Empire – one of the most significant political and economic powerhouses in Europe.



Did you know?

People in Hungary wear a red, white and green circular badge called a '**kokárda**' on 15th March in commemoration of the revolt in 1848.



World War I

After 4 years of war and as a result of the peace treaty in 1919, the Austro-Hungarian Empire was dismantled and the independent state of Hungary assumed its final geographic size and spread. Even today more than 2 million Hungarians live in the surrounding countries, such as Romania, Slovakia, Serbia, Ukraine, Austria and Slovenia.

World War II and the Soviet occupation

By the end of World War II, the Soviets drove the German troops out of the country in 1945 and occupied Hungary for the next four and a half decades.

The Hungarian revolution of 1956

As part of the revolutionary wave in the Eastern Bloc, the Hungarian revolution of 1956 is considered as one of the symbols of resistance against the Soviets during the cold war era. Although the revolution was eventually suppressed, it marked the beginning of a new era. Commemorating the heroes of the revolution, 23 October is a national holiday in Hungary.

The fall of the Soviet rule and the democratic transformation of Hungary

By the end of the 1980s, the swift changes in the Soviet bloc and in the Soviet Union itself led to the fall of the Berlin Wall on 9th November 1989, which affected the entire eastern part of Europe. Countries became free from Soviet rule and Hungary became an independent republic for the third time. The first democratic, multi-party elections were held in 1990.

Joining the European Union

After joining NATO in 1999, Hungary became a member of the European Union in 2004 along with 9 other countries. In 2011 Hungary held the Presidency of the Council of the European Union for the first time.

National holidays

There will be some days when you don't have to go to university and some stores, cinemas etc. will be closed or their working hours and services will be reduced. These happen on national holidays that are the following throughout the year:

- 1st January: New Year's Day
- 15th March: the anniversary of the Hungarian Revolution in 1848
- Good Friday: different every year – the Friday before Easter
- Easter: its exact days are different every year but usually in March or April, from Good Friday through Easter Monday
- Pentecost Monday: 50 days after Easter, usually in May or June
- 1st May: Labour Day
- 20th August: Saint Stephen's Day, who was the founder of Hungary
- 23rd October: National Day in memory of the 1956 revolution
- 1st November: All Saints' Day
- 24–26th December: Christmas





There will be some days that are not holidays but regardless, are widely celebrated in Hungary and you should know about:

- 1st Sunday of May: Mothers' Day
- 6th December: Saint Nicholas' Day
- 31st December: New Year's Eve

Did you know?

Hungarians not only celebrate their birthday but their name day as well and it is sometimes just as important as their birthday. You can follow every name day if you buy a calendar in Hungary!



Language

The official language of the country is Hungarian ("magyar"), which is among the 24 official languages of the European Union.

Hungarian is a unique language being one of the only Finno-Ugric languages in Europe. It is spoken by about 10 million people in Hungary, but there are major populations of Hungarian speakers across the border as well. The Hungarian alphabet consists of 44 letters in total, and as Hungarian is an agglutinative language, some words can be more than 20 letters long. Although learning Hungarian seems to be quite challenging at first, this unique and exotic language is really worth a try. As a Stipendium Hungaricum student, you will take part in Hungarian language courses in the first two semesters of your studies, so get ready to discover the beauty of this thousand-year-old language.

Climate and weather

Hungary has a relatively dry continental climate which, for many international students, can be very different from that of their own country's. Hungary has four different seasons and while summers are warm and sunny, winters can be really cold. Average temperatures range from -7°C in January to 27°C in July and August.

However, the country is protected from extreme weather conditions by the surrounding mountain ranges, the Alps and the Carpathians.

It is not always easy to find the right clothes to suit the weather, but the beauty of each season is definitely makes up for it.

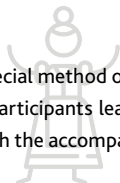


Hungaricums

Hungaricums identify values that are widely cherished and important to Hungarians. Here is a short list that you should definitely know about!

Táncház Method

The Táncház (dance-house) model is a special method of teaching folk dance and preserving intangible cultural heritage: participants learn dances from tradition bearers by observation and imitation, with the accompaniment of live music.



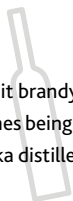
Busó Festivities

This 6-day annual festival in Mohács, located in southern Hungary, marks the end of winter each February. The festival is named 'busó' in acknowledgement of the awesome-looking costumed men wearing wooden masks and large sheepskin coats. According to legend, the roots of the festival date back to the Battle of Mohács in 1526, when villagers dressed up as fearsome monsters to frighten away the occupying Turkish forces.



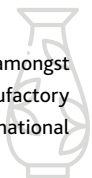
Pálinka

Pálinka is a generic name for the fiery fruit brandy often distilled by farmers from home-grown fruits, the most common ones being plums, apricots, apples, cherries and pears. Hungary's most famous pálinka distilleries can be found in Kecskemét.



Porcelain of Herend

The town of Herend offers luxury hand painted and gilded porcelain. Now amongst the biggest porcelain manufactories in Europe, the Herend Porcelain manufactory was founded in 1826 in a small Hungarian village. In 1855, the international exhibition in Paris brought the highest appreciation for Herend.

Matyó Embroidery

The Matyó community lives in and around the town of Mezőkövesd. The heritage of the community consists of the ethnographic group's living traditional culture, which is embodied by their characteristic style and cultural identity. This folk art is characterised by special floral embroidery filling on textile and ornamented objects.



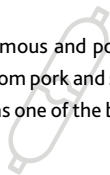
Tokaji Aszú

Described by Louis XIV of France as "the king of wines and the wine of kings", Aszú is in fact even referred to in the Hungarian national anthem. It is one of the world's finest dessert wines.



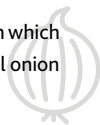
Original Hungarian Winter salami

The PICK factory in Szeged has been producing this famous and popular salami brand for about 140 years, using a secret recipe. Made from pork and spices, winter salami is cured in cold air and is slowly smoked. Known as one of the best salami in Hungary and in the world.



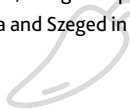
Makó Onion

The town of Makó, situated in south-eastern Hungary, is famous for its onion which is an important ingredient of traditional Hungarian cuisine. An international onion festival is organised in the region each year, which lasts for three days.



Hungarian Paprika

Paprika powder is one of the most widely used spices in Hungarian cuisine. Due to the favourable climate and geographical conditions, Hungarian paprika has a bright red colour and a distinctively rich flavour. Kalocsa and Szeged in the southern part of Hungary are the heart of paprika production.



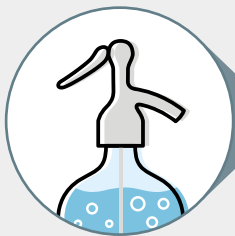

Hungarians have always been great at finding innovative ways to solve problems. Here you can find some famous Hungarian scientific and technological inventions that now surround us every day.



CARBONATED WATER

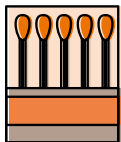
BY ÁNYOS JEDLIK, INVENTOR

The first soda-water machine was invented by Ányos Jedlik in the 1820s, whose name is also linked to the first Hungarian soda manufacturing plant as well. By today, soda water is on the list of Hungaricums.

SAFETY MATCH

BY JÁNOS IRINYI, INVENTOR

The ancestor of the modern safety match was invented by a Hungarian chemist, János Irinyi. He got matches that ignited quietly and smoothly by replacing potassium chlorate with lead oxide.

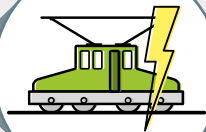




ELECTRIC LOCOMOTIVE

BY KÁLMÁN KANDÓ, ENGINEER

High-voltage motors and generators were developed by Kálmán Kandó, who was also known as the father of electric locomotives. His work on railway electrification was essential to the birth of today's electric trains.



BALLPOINT PEN

BY LÁSZLÓ BÍRÓ, JOURNALIST, INVENTOR

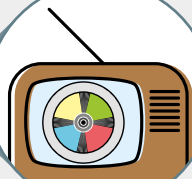
Ball pen, or also called biro after its inventor, is a pen that dispenses ink over a metal ball at its point. Today, it's one of the most widespread writing instruments in the world.



COLOR TELEVISION

BY PÉTER KÁROLY GOLDMARK, PHYSICIST

Field sequential colour technology for colour television was discovered by Péter Károly Goldmark. Among several other inventions, he worked on developing new LP-related technologies as well.





BINOCULARS BY JÓZSEF PETZVAL

As a mathematician and physicist, József Petzval has unparalleled achievements in optics, developing the binoculars and opera glasses among many other things. His work contributed significantly to modern photography and cinematography.

VITAMIN C BY ALBERT SZENTGYÖRGYI, MEDICAL RESEARCHER

The importance of vitamins in our health has long been well-known, but it wasn't until the 1930s that Hungarian scientist, Albert Szent-Györgyi discovered the chemical ascorbic acid—also known as vitamin C.



TUNGSTEN LAMP BY SÁNDOR JUST AND IMRE BRÓDY, ENGINEERS

The Hungarian Sándor Just and Croatian Franjo Hanaman invented a tungsten filament lamp that lasted longer and gave brighter light than its foregoers. Tungsten filament lamps were first sold by the Hungarian company „Tungsram” in 1904.



RUBIK'S CUBE

BY ERNŐ RUBIK, ARCHITECT

Rubik's cube, or also called "Magic Cube", is a 3D combination puzzle, which is still one of the world's best-selling puzzle toys. The World Cube Association organizes various competitions, where the contestants have to solve the Rubik's cube as fast as possible.



WORD & EXCEL

BY CHARLES SIMONYI,
COMPUTER PROGRAMMER

The softwares, Word and Excel, are surely known by most people in the world. The first versions of these OfficeSuite applications were invented by Charles Simonyi, a Hungarian-born computer programmer.

PREZI BY ZUI LABS

The world-famous presentation software was founded by Zui Labs led by its three Hungarian founders. The word, Prezi is the short form of „presentation" in the Hungarian language



Famous Hungarians

Several Hungarian universities were named after famous Hungarian leaders, inventors or artists, who were great innovators in their work. Check out the list of these famous Hungarians below!



Dénes GÁBOR

Electrical engineer, mechanical engineer, and physicist, who received the Noble Prize in Physics for inventing holography.



Károly ESZTERHÁZY

Eszterházy Károly was the Count Bishop of Eger in the late 18th century. Among others, the construction of the famous Lyceum in Eger can be linked to his name.



Lóránd EÖTVÖS

A Hungarian physicist, who is famous for his work on gravitation and surface tension, and the invention of the torsion pendulum. Among others, the Eötvös crater on the moon was named after him.



Ferenc LISZT

Pianist and composer, whose play was fabled throughout the world in the 19th century. His works are essential to understand classical music and his legacy changed music education forever.



Gáspár KÁROLI

The most known and famous Hungarian Calvinist. He translated the Bible into Hungarian in the 16th century (Vizsoly Bible), which was the first Hungarian translation of the Old and New Testaments.



Ignác SEMMELWEIS

The physician who discovered that the principal reason behind childbed fever was insufficient hand disinfection. He is known as the 'saviour of mothers'.



István SZÉCHENYI

Politician, polyhistor, one of the main figures of the reform era. He is famous for the construction of the Chain Bridge located in Budapest, the founding of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, and the opening of the National Theater.



János NEUMANN

The ancestor of all modern computers was invented by János Neumann, a famous mathematician. His so-called "Neumann Principles" laid down the foundations of modern computers.



László MOHOLY-NAGY

A Hungarian painter and photographer, the professor of the Bauhaus school in Germany. He is famous for his pioneering work by integrating technology and industry into arts.



Péter PÁZMÁNY

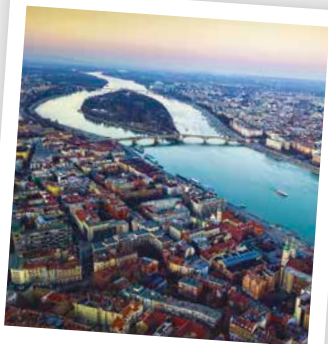
The archbishop of Esztergom, a cardinal and a leading figure of the Catholic renewal of Hungary. He played an important role in the creation of the Hungarian literary language.

BUDAPEST

Budapest is the capital of Hungary, located in the heart of the country. As lying on the banks of the Danube River, Budapest is divided into two main parts: the romantic Buda side with its beautiful hilly surroundings, and the vibrant Pest full of culture and life. The city offers a fusion of various cultural and historic values preserved by its architecture, cosy streets, and numerous exciting events. Budapest, including the Banks of the Danube, the Buda Castle Quarter and the Andrassy Avenue were selected among the UNESCO world heritage sites. The city is not only a cultural, but an educational hub as well – half of Hungary's university students study here, so you will meet a diverse student community coming from all parts of the world.

DEBRECEN

Debrecen is the regional centre of the Northern Great Plain and the seat of Hajdú-Bihar County. The city has a unique balance of centuries-old traditions, where you can find several excellent art exhibitions, various folk programmes as well as many sports and leisure events. One of the most famous of all is the Flower Carnival, which takes place each year on 20th August, and offers amazing cultural experience with parades and numerous music concerts. Debrecen is home to the **University of Debrecen**, located in the beautiful "Great Forest" area. With a student body of about 28,500, the University is one of the largest higher education institutions in Hungary offering more than 80 programmes in almost every study field.

SZEGED

Szeged is the regional centre of South-Eastern Hungary and the seat of Csongrád County. The city lies at the bank of the Tisza River, which gives a picturesque view to the entire area nearby. Szeged gives home to numerous cultural programmes and festivals, such as the famous Szeged Open-Air Festival at the marvellous Cathedral Square or the annually organised SZIN (Youth Days of Szeged), which won the Greener Festival Awards in 2009. With its 12 faculties, 19 doctoral schools

and a Teacher Training Centre, the **University of Szeged** is among the largest and most prestigious higher education institutions in Hungary. The institution has about 21,000 students with a 14% international student ratio, and offers a wide range of academic programmes from humanities to business studies and even health sciences.

MISKOLC

Miskolc is the seat of Borsod-Abaúj-Zemplén County and the regional centre of Northern Hungary. The city is located at the foothills of the Bükk Mountains, near to the UNESCO heritage site of Aggtelek and the world famous Tokaj wine region. Miskolc is full of hidden treasures like the Benedictine Monastery Ruins or the Cave bath of Miskolctapolca, and it is also famous for the Castle of Diósgyőr with its authentic historic plays. Nowadays, Miskolc is one of the most popular choices for students who come to study in Hungary. Founded in 1735, the **University of Miskolc** became the scientific centre of the region offering programmes in the fields of technical and social sciences as well as humanities.

PÉCS

Pécs is located in the south-west of the country and serves as the administrative and economic centre of Baranya County. The city hosts many cultural scenes and historic buildings, such as the Basilica of St. Peter constructed in the 11th century, or the Turkish buildings from the ages of the Ottoman Empire. The city also gives home to the Early Christian Necropolis, the UNESCO World Heritage Site. Thanks to its rich multicultural atmosphere, Pécs was nominated to be the European Capital of Culture in 2010 and received the UNESCO Learning City Award in 2017. The **University of Pécs** was founded in 1367, making it the oldest university in Hungary. It offers a wide scale of degree programmes for more than 20,000 students at 10 faculties, covering nearly every possible field of study.

GYŐR

Győr is located in the north-western part of Hungary. The seat of Győr-Moson-Sopron County lies on one of the most important roads of Central Europe, halfway between Budapest, Vienna and Bratislava. The city has a charming downtown with thousands year-old Christian monasteries, beautiful baroque buildings and romantic riverside boardwalks. The university of Győr, **Széchenyi István University** has an excellent reputation in engineering education, transportation, and telecommunication. For its more than 12,000 students, the university offers first-hand, practice-oriented knowledge and excellent training opportunities through its industrial partners.

NYÍREGYHÁZA

Nyíregyháza is a dynamically developing city located in the northern corner of Hungary. The town is situated next to the holiday resort area of the lake Sóstó ("Salty Lake Bath") with natural thermal water, an open-air museum, a great forest and one of the most famous zoos in Hungary keeping over 500 different species in a natural environment. The **University of Nyíregyháza** is the professional and cultural centre of the region. The university is one of the youngest higher education institutions in Hungary, offering a wide range of educational programmes focusing on applied sciences, like teacher-training, economics, or engineering.

The **University of Nyíregyháza** is one of the youngest universities in Hungary, offering a wide range of educational programmes focused on applied sciences like teacher-training or engineering.

VESZPRÉM

Veszprém is one of the most charming cities of Hungary surrounded by the hills of Bakony and the Balaton Uplands. There are many things to see and do in this mountainous, historical town like several festivals (Streetmusic Festival and the VeszprémFest), the famous Castle District or the popular Veszprém Zoo. **Pannon University** was founded here in 1949 and offers multiple programmes at three university campuses in Veszprém, Kőszeg and Nagykanizsa. Its programmes cover almost all education fields from engineering, media studies to economics and various social sciences, with nearly 60 majors at all degree levels. Thanks to its rich cultural and historic heritage, Veszprém will hold the title of European Capitals of Culture in 2023.

EGER

Eger is located in the northeastern part of Hungary at the feet of the North Hungarian Mountains. The town tells the stories of the Mongol invasion and the Ottoman occupation: the historically significant Castle of Eger, the Turkish Bath, or the Minaret all shape the unique landscape of the region. As being the centre of the Eger wine region, the town gives home to numerous wine cellars and festivals, offering a lot of possibilities to immerse in its culture. It is also known for the famous Bull's Blood wine, the traditional red wine of the region. **Eszterházy Károly University**, with its seat in Eger, offers available courses ranging from economics and social sciences to pedagogy. Beside Eger, the university has campuses in two other towns as well: Gyöngyös and Sárospatak.

DUNAÚJVÁROS

Dunaújváros is situated in the centre of Hungary, quite near – only 67 km – to Budapest. The town has been mainly known by its industry, as it was built related to the Danube Iron Works, the largest metallurgical-mechanical complex of Hungary. It lies only 50 km from the city of Paks, the seat of the Paks Nuclear Power Plant as well. Dunaújváros has many economic values and excellent infrastructural facilities. The **University of Dunaújváros** is located in the heart of the city with a very modern campus of more than 2000 students enrolled. The university offers a wide range of courses from metallurgical and mechanical engineering to communication and media studies.

GÖDÖLLŐ

Proud of its green, panoramic areas, Gödöllő is a university town located very close to Budapest. The town's most famous sight is the Grassalkovich castle: the 18th-century building is one of the largest Baroque castles in Hungary. With the establishment of the Agrarian University, Gödöllő became an agrarian centre of the country in 1950. Today it gives home to the **Hungarian University of Agriculture and Life Sciences** (the former Szent István University), which currently operates not just in Gödöllő, but with one campus in the town of Budapest, Gyöngyös, Kaposvár and Keszthely. With a wide range of education programmes, the university became the agricultural education hub of the country.




Available study programmes


The Stipendium Hungaricum programme is based on bilateral educational cooperation agreements signed between the ministries responsible for education in the sending partners and Hungary. Currently there are nearly 80 Sending Partners in the programme on 5 different continents, and their number increases each year.

Today, 29 Hungarian higher education institutions offer academic programmes for the scholarship holders, who can choose from more than 600 full degree and non-degree programmes conducted primarily in English. Study programmes cover nearly all study fields at all degree levels from Bachelor's, Master's and Doctoral, so you can surely find the one you are most interested in.

The Hungarian higher education system

Higher education studies are offered at two types of higher education institutions, university (egyetem) and college (főiskola). Programmes of higher education are offered at three levels – bachelor's (6-8 semesters), master's (2-4 semesters) and doctoral (4+4 semesters) – which are usually referred to as the three-cycle system according to the European Bologna system. Besides these integrated and cyclic programmes there are one-tier master's programmes (10-12 semesters), where the bachelor's level and the master's level is undivided: veterinary medicine, architecture, dentistry, pharmaceuticals, law and medicine. The one-tier master's (undivided) programmes are equivalent to the master's level, so you will obtain a master's degree at the end of your studies.





Entry and admission requirements in Hungary also follow the standards of the European Bologna Process. This means that a bachelor's degree must be obtained to have access to master's and doctoral programmes. In order to be admitted to a Hungarian higher education institution, prospective students must demonstrate that they meet certain requirements.

Although there is a general system of entrance exams, the entry requirements may differ at certain higher education institutions, so always check the conditions at each institution before applying.

Entry and admission requirements

The scholarship programme is based on bilateral educational cooperation agreements signed between the ministries responsible for education in the sending countries/territories and Hungary, and applicants are eligible to apply for scholarship types and study fields determined in the educational cooperation agreements. Also, applications will be considered eligible only if the applicant is nominated by the responsible authorities of the Sending Partner. The list of the Sending Partners and available study fields can be found on the website:

Application procedure



If you wish to apply for the Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship, these are the steps you need to follow:

- 1. Visit** the Stipendium Hungaricum website and check if you are eligible to participate in the scholarship programme. You can find the list of the eligible Sending Partners and the available study fields here: stipendiumhungaricum.hu/partners/ (You should also check the eligibility criteria section of the relevant Call for Applications!)
- 2. Go** to the Apply page on the website, read the relevant Call for Applications and its Annexes carefully, check the Application Timeline and the Useful Documents: stipendiumhungaricum.hu/apply/
- 3. After** reading the relevant Call for Applications and getting familiar with the process, **contact** the responsible authority of your country, and make sure about the exact application deadlines and requirements. You can find the contact details of the responsible authority in your country on the Partners page of the website: stipendiumhungaricum.hu/partners/

- 4. Register** at the DreamApply application system:

- 5. Check** which documents must be attached to your application.

October-November: Announcement of the annual call

Tempus Public Foundation announces the annual call for the scholarship programme. Read the Call for Applications and prepare your application documents accordingly.

January: Deadline for submitting the application

Submit your application through the DreamApply application system by the deadline given in the Call for Application. Make sure that all required documents are attached, and all required fields are filled out properly.

3.

February: First selection point and nomination process

If your application meets the formal requirements, it will be forwarded to your Sending Partner. The Sending Partners will select the applications, then send back a nomination list to Tempus Public Foundation by the end of February.



4.

March-May: Second selection point – institutional admission procedure

If you become a nominated applicant, your application will be forwarded to your selected Host Institutions (universities). The universities will get in touch with you directly to set a date for the entrance exams.

5.

June: Notification about your selection results

Based on your application preferences, entrance exams and the capacities of the Host Institutions, Tempus Public Foundation will decide on your application. After receiving your admission notification, you must enter the online application system and accept the scholarship within 2 weeks.

6.

June-July: Starting the visa process

DreamApply

DreamApply is the online system where international students can apply for the Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship and manage administrative duties related to the process. The main purpose of the DreamApply online application platform is to collect the details and documents of the applicant in one place and allow the prospective student to upload and modify their submissions easily and in a timely manner.

DreamApply is also the platform where you can receive notifications about your scholarship application, follow the upcoming application procedure deadlines and communicate with the selected higher education institution or the customer service of the Tempus Public Foundation.

Frequently asked questions

Do the Stipendium Hungaricum applicants have to pay for their application?

No, the online application (registration) and the participation in the admission examinations is free of charge. Do not apply through any agencies unknown by the selected Host Institutions (see our website for the list of agencies known by the universities) and do not pay for their services regarding the application because the programme is implemented by direct cooperation with the responsible authorities of the Sending Partners, not agencies.

Where can applicants get help for the online application system?

Please do not forget that you need to submit your Stipendium Hungaricum application on this online platform, starting with a registration: apply.stipendiumhungaricum.hu. If you get stuck at any point of the process, contact our office via email, skype or telephone.

Do applicants have to be nominated by their country?

Yes, only the nominated applicants will be forwarded to the universities.

Is it possible to submit an application for the scholarship more than once during a year?

No, there is only one application deadline each year.

Can applicants bring their families?

Yes, it is possible but the Stipendium Hungaricum office does not provide visa, administrative services (e.g. supporting letters) or any additional contribution (e.g. financial support) to family members or accompanying persons.

Why some countries are not eligible to apply?

Because there is no valid educational cooperation programme between those countries and Hungary.

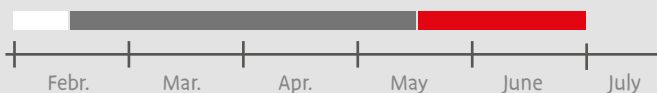
Academic year

Provisions covered by the scholarship

As a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder, your university studies in Hungary will be supported in many ways depending on the academic programme you applied for. See how the scholarship contributes to your academic years.

1. Tuition-free education

Your tuition fee is completely covered by the scholarship.

2. Monthly contribution to your living costs

- › If you are a scholarship holder of non-degree, bachelor's, master's, one-tier master's or postgraduate specialist training courses, you will receive a monthly amount of HUF 43,700 (cca EUR 120) contribution to your living expenses.
- › If you are a scholarship holder of doctoral programmes, you will receive a monthly amount of HUF 140,000 (cca EUR 390) contribution to your living expenses for the first phase of your education (4 semesters), and HUF 180,000 (cca EUR 500) for the second phase of your education (4 semesters).

3. Contribution to your accommodation costs

You will receive a free dormitory place or a contribution of HUF 40,000/month to your accommodation costs. Please note, that if you live in a rented apartment, this contribution may not cover the full amount of your rental costs.

4. Free medical insurance

You will receive free medical insurance and other supplementary medical insurance for up to HUF 65,000 (cca EUR 180) a year.

Legal stay



VISA Process

Depending on which country you are from, you might need a visa to legally enter Hungary. Contact the Embassy of Hungary accredited to your country to check if you need a visa to enter the country. It is important to make the necessary arrangements well ahead of time because it may take 30 days until a visa is issued. Start the visa application process right away – within two weeks at the latest – after you have received the Letter of Acceptance and Letter of Award of your scholarship!

Residence permit

After your arrival, you need to ensure your legal status in Hungary. Depending on your home country, different rules apply. Generally, students outside the EU/EEA member states need to obtain a residence permit. This document is issued by the National Directorate-General for Aliens Policing, so check their website for more information.

Your university might also give you assistance with the visa and residence permit process, so ask your coordinator or your mentor (More information on [Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Programme](#) – for further guidance.

Accommodation

As a scholarship holder, you will have accommodation contribution as part of the provisions covered by the scholarship. You can choose between free dormitory places or a contribution of HUF 40,000/month to accommodation expenses for the whole duration of the scholarship.

Please note, that if you do not want to live in the dormitory, the HUF 40,000/month is a contribution to the rental costs, and in bigger cities – especially in the capital – this contribution might not cover the full amount of the rental costs.

In the city centres, the average rental of private flats is between HUF 80,000–180,000, while shared flats are about HUF 45,000–120,000 per month/person. Landlords usually require you to pay a deposit in advance, which usually equals to a minimum of 2 months' rental fee (this will be paid back when you move out). Remember that to acquire a residence permit, you will need to sign a contract with your landlord to have a registered address.

If you need help, contact your international coordinator or mentor at your university, who will guide you in the right direction. There are usually dedicated Facebook pages. Some students find agencies useful in the process.

Wherever you live, the most important thing is to find a place where you can study comfortably, and it is a plus if you can share it with your new friends.





Currency

The forint (HUF) has been the local currency in Hungary since 1946. Here is a little help to see the differences between different currencies (valid in July 2021) but you should always check the actual exchange rate.

Banknotes come in denominations of 500; 1,000; 2,000; 5,000; 10,000 and 20,000 and six different coins are in use: the 5, 10, 20, 50, 100 and 200 coins.

Major bank cards (Visa, Mastercard) are accepted in most places but there are cases when you can only pay with cash. ATMs and currency exchange offices are widely available.

You can also open a bank account as the non-residential account service is designed especially for foreign nationals. Before opening an account, it is advisable to ask the chosen bank about the documents required. Banks are usually open between 8.00–16.00 on weekdays.

Working while studying

Since you are a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder, you are arriving from a non-EEA country, which means you can be employed during your studies with a residence permit for study purposes and either work 24 hours a week during your study period, or 90 days outside your study period.

As a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder however, you are also entitled and often even required to participate in an internship opportunity as a prerequisite of your last semester, just before graduating. You can read more about the internship opportunities for the Stipendium Hungaricum students in the last chapter.



Health care and insurance

First aid and emergency treatment is free for every international student. Besides, the Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holders are entitled to free medical care during their stay in Hungary and supplementary medical insurance for up to HUF 65,000 (cca EUR 180) a year.

For free medical care in Hungary, you will need a social security card ("TAJ" card), with which you can access the public healthcare anytime, not just in emergencies.

Follow these steps to apply for a TAJ card:

- › After arrival, contact your Stipendium Hungaricum coordinator at your university.
- › Your university will request you a TAJ number from the office of National Health Insurance Fund, and notify you when your TAJ number is ready.
- › After receiving your TAJ number, you should start arranging your TAJ card application personally in the office of the National Health Insurance Fund.

For the TAJ card application, you will need the following documents:

- › Residence permit
- › Passport
- › Accommodation confirmation (or address card)
- › Letter of Award (you can download this from the administrative system of your university)
- › Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship agreement
- › Student status certificate



After you arrive in Hungary, you shall also take part in a free medical examination organized by your university. For more information about the medical care at your university, please contact the Stipendium Hungaricum coordinator of your university.



Medications

The Hungarian word for pharmacy is 'gyógyszertár' or 'patika'. These are located all over the cities, usually close to the city centres, supermarkets and, in some cases, nearby universities as well. Opening hours may vary from pharmacy to pharmacy but usually they are open till 7 pm or 8 pm on weekdays. Drug stores carry a minimum amount of light medicine, for example pain killers.

Frequently asked questions

> ***How do I sign my scholarship contract?***

Signing the contract with the institution must be arranged between the scholarship holder and the institution. Regarding the agreement and its content, please contact your institutional SH coordinator.

> ***Do I have to reside in Hungary?***

You must habitually reside in Hungary during your study period and must inform your higher education institution in case of leaving for more than 10 working days. If you fail to inform your university about your stay abroad prior to the travel, the higher education institution may decide to terminate your scholarship status.

> ***Can I apply for other grants?***

Regarding the fact that the SH scholarship covers studies in Hungary, the scholarship holder is not entitled to use financial support for doing programmes or partial studies outside Hungary, e.g. Erasmus +, CEEPUS or Campus Mundi. However, for a short stay (not longer than 10 working days), you are allowed to participate at a conference related to research or studies funded by institutional sources, and a stay that does not affect the requirement of the habitual residency principle.

> ***How do I get my scholarship allowances?***

The monthly stipend and accommodation contribution must be arranged between the scholarship holder and the university. For more information please contact your institutional SH coordinator.

Public transportation

Hungary has a well-connected and integrated public transport network, and each city has its own ticketing system and services. Buses run in all cities, trolleybuses, trams, and night buses in bigger cities, and you can also find metro services, suburban railway lines (called HÉV), and boat services in Budapest. For Budapest Public Transportation (BKK) you can buy tickets from newspaper kiosks, stations, or vending machines. If you prefer online solutions, you can also buy mobile tickets through different apps who are in contract with BKK, such as the Simple app.

For journey planning in Budapest use the BKK Futár app where you can always find updates on scheduled departure times! Single tickets are only valid for one journey without transfer, so if you need to change, you will need to validate multiple tickets. However if you travel by metro you can change between the various metro lines with a single ticket too. If you regularly use public transportation, it is worth buying a monthly or yearly pass.

If you like to travel within the country, you can either opt for coaches or take a train. Public transport coaches are operated by the bus company, Volánbusz and the trains are run by the Hungarian public railway network called MÁV. You can buy coach tickets at the bus station or from the driver upon boarding. Train tickets can be bought at the train station or online through the MÁV app. Students with a valid student card are entitled to half-price fare rates for all kinds of public transport.





TAXI

When taking a taxi, you should avoid hailing unmarked taxi cabs. You can hail a taxi on the streets, order by phone, or an app. In Budapest, licensed taxis appear in distinct yellow.

BICYCLE

There are more and more bike roads throughout Hungary, so you can easily get to many destinations within Budapest and in the countryside too by bike. You can buy a bicycle in many big stores or even a good quality old one in some second-hand bike shops. Larger cities have their own bike-share service, such as MOL BuBi in Budapest or CityBike in Szeged, and you can also rent a bike from various companies.



AIRPORT SHUTTLE

From Liszt Ferenc International Airport you have more options to get to the city center of Budapest. The cheapest solution is using public transportation, the Airport shuttle bus 100E will take you to the center in around 30 minutes. From the airport, you can also take a taxi or choose the shuttle services of various private companies.

Student card

After you arrive in Hungary, it is obligatory to request a student card (an orange-brown plastic card) that will certify your student status. The student card is free of charge, and it displays your personal data (name, place and date of birth, address, type of student status), the name of your university and the period of validity. With a student card, you can access a number of services and discounts not only at your university, but also in several commercial places, so it will surely bring you many benefits during your academic studies.



To obtain a student card, you should take the following steps:

STEP 1:

Go to a Government Window (in Hungarian: Kormányablak) and apply for a student card. The officers will take a photo of you and register your personal data, so don't forget to take your passport and residence permit with you! You can find Government Windows in every city and district in Hungary, so don't worry, there will always be one within easy reach.

STEP 2:

Register your application electronically in the administrative system of your university.

STEP 3:

If your application was successful, your student card is issued by the responsible governmental office. When ready, it will be mailed to your university where you can receive it in person.



Until your student card arrives, you can request a temporary card from the registrar's office of your university. The temporary student card is valid for 60 days and entitles you to the same discounts as the permanent card.

Student card entitles you to many discounts during your Hungarian stay: from public transportation tickets, museum entrance fees, youth hostel accommodation, library memberships to various commercial places. As a member of the European Youth Card Association (EYCA), the Hungarian student card is accepted not only in Hungary, but in most EU countries as well.



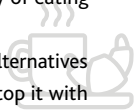
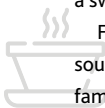
Hungarian cuisine

Food is a vital part of both life and culture, so to make the best out of discovering Hungary, we suggest you try the delicious and diverse flavours of Hungarian cuisine too.

Hungarian cuisine is well-known for paprika, black pepper, onion, and garlic. Although traditional Hungarian dishes are primarily based on meats and dairy products, the country offers a wide selection of seasonal fruits and vegetables throughout the year thanks to its excellent geographical location. To discover the hidden culinary treasures of the country, let us invite you to a day of eating traditional Hungarian meals.

A typical Hungarian **breakfast** starts with fresh white bread (popular alternatives are bread rolls called "**zsemle**", or the crescent moon-shaped "**kifli**"), top it with cold cuts ("**kolbász**" or "**szalámi**") and add fresh vegetables: tomatoes, onion, or pepper. Hungarians tend to like their breakfasts on the savoury side, but if you have a sweet tooth, you can also choose milk bread ("**kalács**") with fresh fruits.

For **lunch**, which is the main meal of the day, get ready for a three-course menu: soup is usually followed by a main dish and a dessert. You may have heard of the famous Hungarian Goulash ("**Gulyás**") soup that was accredited as a Hungaricum in 2017. Traditional Goulash is made from root vegetables and beef, but you can opt for a vegetarian version too. Another famous soup is fisherman's soup ("**halászlé**"):



a velvety, paprika-infused broth with thick cuts of river fish in it. Since Hungary is rich in water resources as it has the river Tisza, river Danube and several lakes, it is easy to try special types of local fish.

As for the main dish, stews and meat cuts tend to dominate the traditional scene (such as Hungarian **chicken stew**, "**rostélyos**" or "**vadas**") but vegetable stews called "**főzelék**" are also widely served. Pasta dishes, both sweet (such as plum dumplings – "**szilvás gombóc**") and savoury (as cottage cheese – "**túrós tészta**") are a popular choice too.

Dinner is usually served cold, including cold cuts, fresh cheese, and dairy products (try the Hungarian cottage cheese "**túró**", or sour cream "**tejföl**" or the seasoned mixture of these two "**körözött**") with vegetables.

If you feel like having a drink after a good meal, taste one of the exceptional **Hungarian wines**. Hungary has 22 wine regions, the most well-known among foreigners are the Tokaj, Villány, Balaton Highland and Eger regions, but it is also worth visiting other regions for their special local wines. On the stronger side, two unique drinks to Hungary are **Unicum** (herb infusion) and **Pálinka** (fruit brandy) that are often consumed as a digestive after a hearty meal.

There are some more options which are not part of the main list, but we could not leave out.

Savoury must-tries include "**lángos**" which is a plate-sized sheet of deep-fried dough, usually smothered with sour cream and topped with grated cheese. Stuffed cabbage called "**töltött káposzta**" is a popular dish too: large leaves of fermented cabbage, stuffed with meat and rice, cooked and then topped with sour cream; or





the well-known "**lecsó**", the paprika-based vegetable stew of onions, tomatoes and peppers with variations including sausage and egg.

Sweet must-tries: don't miss out on the **Dobos cake**, a chocolate buttercream-layered sponge cake, topped with crystallized caramel and covered with nuts on the edges, neither the chimney cake ("**kürtös kalács**") or the incredibly popular **Túró Rudi**, a dark chocolate bar filled with sweetened cottage cheese ("**túró**"), available in different flavours or with jam fillings as well. Desserts often contain different fruits or jams since Hungary has internationally famous vineyards and orchards full of apples, pears, plums and other fruits.



Special food options in Hungary

› SPECIAL DIETARY NEEDS

Just like any other European country, Hungary has caught up with healthy food trends. You can buy gluten- and lactose-free products in most supermarkets. For instance, a wide range of milk substitute products are available in stores. In addition, whole grain products have become ever so popular nationwide.

› KOSHER OR HALAL FOOD IN HUNGARY

Numerous restaurants and supermarkets are selling kosher and halal food in the country. Due to its size, Budapest has the largest number of places where religious dietary options are available. However, bigger university towns, such as Debrecen or Szeged, also provide access to these food options.

› VEGAN, VEGETARIAN OPTIONS

Although Hungarian cuisine is famous for its meat-based dishes, you would be surprised how easy it is to find places to eat well without meat or animal products. There are numerous Hungarian dishes prepared with potato, cauliflower, cheese, mushroom or zucchini. Salads are also well-known in Hungarian cuisine and are popular. There are several restaurants which specialise in vegan or vegetarian dishes. If you want to cook at home, you can find more and more alternatives in shops to substitute meat with other options.



HUNGARIAN CHICKEN STEW RECIPE

- 2 tablespoons oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 large tomato, peeled, seeds removed, and chopped
- 1 1/4 pounds (600 grams) boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into bite-size pieces
- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup water
- 1-2 teaspoons sea salt



In a deep pan, heat the oil over medium heat. Once heated, add the onion and cook, stirring occasionally, until softened. Stir in the garlic and cook until just fragrant, for about 30 seconds.

Remove the pot from the heat and stir in the paprika. Add the chicken pieces and return the pot to medium heat. Cook, stirring occasionally until the edges of the chicken are browned. Mix in the tomato, bell pepper, and 1/2 cup water. Season with salt. Once the liquid begins to boil, reduce the heat to a simmer, cover, and cook for an hour until the chicken is cooked through and tender. Season with additional salt if needed.

Serve hot with Nokedli or pasta.



Campus life

Beyond focusing on your studies, it is also important to take care of your mental and physical health. Most Hungarian higher education institutions have their own swimming pools and sports centres and provide various sporting opportunities. Universities also ensure counselling services for international students too, so do not hesitate to contact their team, if you need any help or advice.

Universities in Hungary also have their own libraries which provide a calm environment for your studies and research. Many university libraries date back to more than a hundred years, and have a truly special atmosphere and architecture.

Most universities offer a wide range of cultural activities and events as well, which are the perfect way to find new friends. Become a member of a university choir, dance or drama group, or even an orchestra! By joining these classes, you can improve your collaborative skills and gain experience of what "team spirit" really is. Contact your international coordinator to know more about what your university can offer.



Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Programme

Once you start your new life in Hungary, you will have many questions either about your university programme or about everyday practicalities. It comes very handy, especially at the beginning of your stay, when someone with substantial experience can help you to find your way around in a new environment and culture.

The Stipendium Hungaricum Mentor Network organized by the HÖÖK (National Union of Students in Hungary) will guide you during your university years offering a mentor programme and also different trainings and courses. The various events and the dedicated mentors can help you with almost every problem during your stay in Hungary. The mentors assist with the administrative and educational tasks of their mentees and help them to become familiar with Hungarian culture and routine. The mentors always attend the same university as their mentees, and you can always turn to them when you need personal support or guidance with your studies or everyday life.

The Mentor Network organizes several cultural and touristic programmes for its members to make the students' stay in Hungary pleasant and to show them the values of the country. All of these events are free for the members. Joining the Network is also a good way to find new friends and to extend your social network, so it is definitely worth participating in the events of this international community.

Research opportunities

Have you heard of HandInScan, the medical device that revolutionized hand hygiene protocol thereby reducing the risk of spreading infectious diseases, or the iKnife that finds cancer during an operation? These are only some of those inventions that have been developed at Hungarian universities.

Research groups and centres

As a Stipendium Hungaricum student, you have many opportunities to carry out research activities in Hungary. Today, there are more than 150 research groups at Hungarian universities in all fields of science. Research groups may work within the faculties or departments, but some universities have their own – or are in connection with larger independent – research centres, with the most cutting-edge laboratories and infrastructure. Thanks to the rich international relations of the universities, you may also have the opportunity to work in cooperation with other university research groups from all parts of the world, publish in national and

international journals and present your results at various scientific conferences and events. As a doctoral student you will also have the chance to publish your work in the Research Paper publication of the Stipendium Hungaricum PhD students.

Colleges for Advanced Studies

Many universities offer Colleges for Advanced Studies ('szakkollégium' in Hungarian), which are based on self-governed education and research activities with students who wish to expand their knowledge in a specific study field.

Students' Scientific Association (TDK)

As an international student, you can also take part in the research activity of the prestigious Students' Scientific Association – TDK (which stands for 'Tudományos Diákkör' in Hungarian). TDK is a Hungarian speciality of university talent management that has a history of more than half a century, offering in-depth individual research under the supervision of top Hungarian professors.

If you want to know more about the research opportunities at your institution, you should inquire at your faculty or department once you are enrolled. If you are interested in the latest research results and inventions, we advise you to visit the Researchers' Night events organised at many universities all over the country each year.





Learning Hungarian

As a Stipendium Hungaricum student, you have many opportunities to learn Hungarian both face-to-face and online. To help you get the most out of your Hungarian stay, every scholarship holder at bachelor's and master's level (except those who learn in a Hungarian programme) will study Hungarian as a foreign language for two semesters. The courses are offered by the host universities with an exam at the end. Bear in mind, that if you do not attend the language course and do not pass the exam, you will lose all or part of your monthly stipend.

Although learning Hungarian is mandatory only in the first two semesters, you may go on with your Hungarian studies in the following years as well. Many universities offer Hungarian language courses each semester, so contact the Stipendium Hungaricum coordinator of your university for more information. You can also turn to a Stipendium Hungaricum mentor at your university to help you find the best learning opportunities but if you wish to practice alone, you should try our "[Practice your Hungarian](#)" online course.



Even if Hungarian seems to be different from other languages at first, there is no reason to worry: with perseverance and a little practice, you will soon be able to learn this special and exotic language. Be active during the Hungarian language courses and take every opportunity to talk to native speakers and Hungarian students. This is your chance to become a member of an exclusive and wonderful language community!

VISIT

Museums are good starting points to learn more about Hungarian culture. **The Night of Museums** is a great one-night event where more than 250 cultural institutions all around Hungary are open to visitors all night long, from the largest exhibitions of the Hungarian National Museum to the more specific museums such as the Zsolnay Museum in Pécs.

Budapest has an inspiring contemporary art and design scene with hotspots such as the Bartók Béla Boulevard in the 11. district, where you can find numerous independent galleries, antique shops or art cafes. Szentendre, "the city of arts" also has plenty of art galleries and museums on the Danube riverbank in the neighbourhood of Budapest. The countryside has a lot to offer too: the oldest cultural festival, the Valley of Arts with more than 500 programmes in the beautiful environment of the Balaton Uplands region is a great and fun event to discover Hungarian culture.





LISTEN

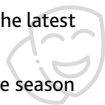
Whether you prefer classical or contemporary music, you can always find concerts and festivals happening in Hungary. Every year there are plenty of symphonic concerts and choirs performing all over the country, and there are many outdoor events, street music festivals and celebrations with live music. As a music lover it is worth visiting the cultural centre Müpa Budapest that provides home for classical, contemporary, popular and world music, not to mention jazz and opera, as well as contemporary circus, dance, literature and film.



We have to mention the huge festival culture Hungary has. Sziget Festival in Budapest, VOLT Festival in Sopron, Campus Festival in Debrecen and EFOTT at Lake Velence attracts thousands of students from all parts of the country.

WATCH

With two Academy Awards in the last decade ("Son of Saul" in 2015 and "Sing" in 2016) and many international prizes, the Hungarian film industry is widely recognised around the world. Visit the local film festivals such as The Hungarian Motion Picture Festival or the Cinefest Film Festival in Miskolc to watch the latest Hungarian films.



There is a very rich and active theatre life throughout the country. The season starts in September and ends in May, but there are some theatre festivals and open-air performances during summertime as well.

For dance performance enthusiasts, we also have classical ballet and contemporary dance. Keep an eye out for the Ballets of Győr (Győri Balett) and Pécs (Pécsi Balett), and the dance companies of Pál Frenák or Adrienn Hód. Going to the Opera House in Budapest (www.opera.hu) at least once is a must, not just because of the high-quality performances but for the imposing building itself.



GET INSPIRED

The Hungarian design and fashion scene has a lot to offer from trendy local fashion brands to design fairs, workshops and creative studios. Check out the latest design trends at the annual Budapest Design Week and the collections of Hungarian fashion designers at the Budapest Central European Fashion Week.



TRY IT YOURSELF

If you want to enjoy Hungarian folk traditions more actively, our best tip is to find your local Community, Cultural or Youth Centres, where you can join workshops, afternoon clubs, presentations, talks, sports events, concerts. A special thing quite popular among international students is the dance house movement, a real short-cut to understand another nation without even saying a word.

DID YOU KNOW?

In 2023 the Western-Hungarian city of Veszprém and the Bakony-Balaton region will jointly hold the European Capital of Culture title. Throughout the whole year the region will be the most important cultural spot of Europe with an abundance of cultural projects and events.

Frequently asked questions

➤ How many international students study at Hungarian universities?

About 38,000 international students from all over the world arrive in Hungary for study purposes. International students are welcome to study not only in Budapest, but in the eastern, western and southern parts of Hungary as well. ➤ Is it easy to travel around the neighbouring countries of Hungary?

Hungary is situated in the heart of Central Europe. Capitals of Central European countries, such as Vienna or Bratislava, are easily accessible by train from Budapest. There are no big distances in Central Europe, therefore your trips should not take too long, only a couple of hours. The website of the Hungarian State Railways is available in English, therefore you can easily plan your journey to the surrounding countries.

➤ Do most people speak fluent English in Hungary?

Students in Hungary start learning English in primary school, so most young people can communicate in English. In a university environment, you should not have any problems in this respect.

➤ How difficult is it to learn Hungarian? Why do people say Hungarian is one of the most difficult languages?

The Hungarian language is often described as one of the most unique and challenging languages in the world with its flexible word order and complex rules. However, with practice and hard work you can understand basic grammatical rules and expressions, which will be especially important during your Hungarian stay. Interestingly, while most European languages belong to the Indo-European language family, Hungarian is in the Uralic language family together with Finnish and Estonian.

Internship opportunities

As a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder you are entitled and often even required to participate in an internship opportunity as a prerequisite of your last semester, just before graduating. Every year during the second (spring) semester, Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder international students are contacted with internship opportunities, tailor-made by the Tempus Public Foundation and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

The list of opportunities will be collected and sent to you based on your field and advancement of your study and will consist of the Hungarian companies that are excited to welcome Stipendium Hungaricum students for a previously specified period of time.

Please note, that while the internship opportunity is available for all Stipendium Hungaricum students, participation is not guaranteed. The selection of students depends on an application procedure where you present your CV, academic and professional background and motivation and the participating companies are responsible for the evaluation of your application.

Diploma recognition



The recognition of Hungarian degrees by other countries is based on bilateral education agreements between Hungary and the governments of the respected country. Your Sending Partner might be a good starting point to receive further information on what recognition procedure you need to go through in order to have your Hungarian diploma recognized in your country.

If you obtain your degree in Hungary and wish to study in another EU country, you need to go through a specific diploma recognition procedure. Before starting, go to the ENIC-NARIC's website (European Network of Information Centres) to

receive more information on the process and the required documents. All the national institutions are listed here so you can contact the responsible authorities.

Student mobility after graduation

As long as you are a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship holder, you cannot take part in other scholarship programmes. Once you have graduated, however, and you wish to study further, you are free to apply for various scholarships within the framework of your new study programme.

As a Stipendium Hungaricum doctoral student, you can apply for the Stipendium Hungaricum dissertation scholarship, which gives you a grant for the time you complete your doctoral dissertation. The duration of this scholarship starts in the month following the last month of the semester during which doctoral students obtain their pre-degree certificate (absolutorium) and lasts for the number of awarded months, but no later than the month of the public defense of your thesis. The maximum duration of the Stipendium Hungaricum dissertation scholarship is 12 months.

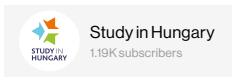

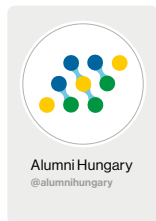
