6 ISSUES

from the first round of reviews to stimulate the debate







Widening concept of knowledge exchange (KE) (third mission, valorisation)


- KE is a process that ensures that the outcomes of scientific knowledge add value beyond the scientific domain (Benneworth and Jongbloed (2010)
- KE takes different forms and involves all disciplines (away from a STEM-only focus)
- KE engage knowledge producers, transformers and users into dynamic relationships
- KE spans across local, national and global levels

2. Emergence of new job profiles & support structures related to the entrepreneurial agenda

- Building leadership & continuity inside the HEI and towards external stakeholders
- Senior-level positions (e.g., Vice-Rectors, Deans), Policy Advisors (NLD)
- Support services and rewards for getting staff involved in knowledge exchange







3. Interdisciplinarity from research to education

- Grand challenges are reflected in interdisciplinary calls in competitive research funding → stimulates the emergence of interdisciplinary education programmes
- More common in NLD and IRE than in HUN, POL, BGL
- Why? Advances in organisational capacity (e.g., NLD: flagship initiatives, IRE: innovation fund) and accreditation





4. Greater attention to local/regional ecosystems

- New relevance of regional/local governments and networks as partners for the "entrepreneurial agenda" of HEIs
- **Examples:** HUN: FIEK, IRE: Regional Skills Fora, NLD: City Deals, POL: incubator networks, BGL: border regions
- Why? Availability of regional/local funding,
 Smart Specialisation, people, ...





5. Building & nurturing international links: Connecting with international students and staff

 More needs to be done to create synergies between the internationalisation & entrepreneurial agendas

Questions for the 2nd round of reviews:

- How to engage international students and staff in the entrepreneurial agenda? (E.g. stay-on schemes in IRE & NLD)
- How to build effective alumni networks? What can cities do?
- How to overcome barriers to link SMEs with international students?






6. Students are key catalysts for the entrepreneurial agenda

 "Even though the majority of students (in practically all countries and HEIs) may be largely unaware of, or indifferent to venture

creation as a viable career option, there will always be a group of interested students to build on." (OECD/EU, 2017)

 Students need incentives & support (e.g. diploma supplements, e-portfolios), and flexibility for student start-ups to reduce dropout risk








